Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Kathy Crum was born in St. Louis, Missouri in October 1956. She attended school in St. Louis and graduated from Ritenour High School in 1975. She earned a BS degree in 1979 in education and psychology from Illinois College in Jacksonville, Illinois and later earned a Masters' degree from Sangamon State (now University of Illinois-Springfield) in educational administration. Kathy began her teaching career in Alexander and Ashland before moving to Wichita, Kansas where she taught 5th and 6th grade from 1984-86. She moved to Springfield in 1986. Her positions in the School District #186 included teaching reading, serving as an administrative intern, principal at Graham Elementary School for eight years, and later as a central office administrator working on curriculum instruction. Kathy retired from District #186 in 2013. Following retirement, she started her own business, Kathy Crum Consulting, Inc. which works with schools nationwide.

Kathy discusses the use of a balanced (year-round scheduling) schedule at Graham Elementary School. Two schools in District #186 have used this scheduling option for many years. She covers how the school went to a balanced schedule after Southern View, another district school, used it. She reviews the study conducted on this type of scheduling, parental involvement in approving this schedule (80% vote), teaching assignment/transfers in or from the school, and establishing a yearly schedule beginning in mid-July (9 weeks on and 2-3 weeks off). She discusses the advantages and challenges of such a schedule, including intense learning time, reduced summer loss of learning, vacation family time, early childhood readiness and out of district transfers. Other topics covered include hiring staff prior to the start date of July, collective bargaining language, the use of summer classes, and the use of intersession classes during break time.
