Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Richard Kahne was born in April 1935 in Chicago IL. His father worked as a photo engraver while his mother was a housewife. During his childhood, Richard and his friends went to the park, and played pool (billiards) during the summer and ice-skated in the winter. After graduation from Von Stuben High School in Chicago, Richard started working with his family at his uncle's photo engraving. After a few months he found a job at Illinois Bell working as a draftsman. In 1965, Richard moved to Springfield to work at the Illinois Bell headquarters and as he mentions "I moved to Springfield for Lincoln." During his time in Springfield, Richard became involved with the Illinois Tourism Commission, creating the State Journal-Register's (SJR) Family of the Week series as well as working on the nation's Bicentennial in 1976. In 1980, Richard worked on a commission for the Illinois and Michigan Canal and attended a signing by then President Ronald Reagan. As Richard continued to work with Illinois Bell and tourism in Springfield he wanted to work on one final project; that project ended up being the reopening of the Lincoln home here in Springfield.
