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## Abstract

## John Louis Frothingham, Veterans Remember, VR2-V-D-2007-048

**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** John Louis Frothingham was born on July 13, 1918 in Boston, Massachusetts. After resigning from the ROTC program at the University of Illinois, he entered the Candidate Class of the Marine Corps in Quantico, Virginia. In February 1941, Frothingham was called to active duty, commissioned as a second lieutenant, and entered reserved officers' training. After entering the Artillery Branch in Quantico, Frothingham transferred to the 1<sup>st</sup> Marine Division in the spring 1942. He married his wife, Katherine, in March 1942, while he was training at New River, North Carolina.

After a horrible defeat in the Fiji Islands, Frothingham's battalion moved in August 1942 to Guadalcanal, where the Japanese had retreated. Under the 1<sup>st</sup> Marine Division, Fronthingham was a part of the 7<sup>th</sup> Marine Regiment and was attached to the164<sup>th</sup> Infantry Regiment. In November, he defended their airfields from Japanese invasion when crossing the Matanikau River. In December 1942, Frothingham was shipped to Melbourne and Ballarat, Australia where he was made Captain. Later Frothingham was transferred to Auckland, New Zealand and then returned to Guadalcanal.

With the addition of new Marine Corps Divisions, Frothingham returned to the United States in March 1944 under the 5<sup>th</sup> Marine Division. During training in Hawaii, Frothingham became Major and was transferred to the tank battalion. The 5<sup>th</sup> Division battled in Iwo Jima against Japan, using flame-throwing tanks, before reaching the headquarters of Kuribayashi.
