**Biographical Information Overview of Interview:** Sergeant John Herbst was born on October 24th, 1975 in Orange County, California and grew up as an "Army Brat." His father was an enlisted man in the Field Artillery, and latter was commissioned. John's family lived on Army installations in Hawaii, Colorado, Oklahoma and Germany. His father retired after serving as an ROTC instructor at Western Illinois University in Macomb.

John enlisted in B Battery, 1st Battalion, 123d Field Artillery, part of the Illinois National Guard (also in Macomb) in December 1992. He served a two-year proselytizing mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (Mormon) in Winnipeg Canada from 1995 to 1997. He then joined the regular Army, serving as a Multiple Launch Rocket System (MLRS) crewman in the 1st Battalion, 33rd Field Artillery (attached to 1st Infantry Division), stationed in Bamberg Germany. He did a brief deployment in Bosnia in support of the United Nations' International FORce, (IFOR). He reenlisted in the military police, and was in training at Ft. Leonard Wood Missouri during the 9/11 attacks. He returned to Germany, and provided base security until deployed to Kosovo as part of the United Nations' Kosovo FORce (KFOR) in 2002 where he was involved in enforcement missions against the illegal weapons trade, etc. He completed his service at Ft. Dettrick, Maryland, duty which included short missions escorting prisoners from Iraq and Afghanistan. At the time of the interview he was a senior at Western Illinois University, majoring in political science.
