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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Josephine 'Jo' (Gon) Datz was born on February 4th, 1963 in Johannesburg, South Africa, the daughter of a Lithuanian immigrant father whose family had fled Jewish persecution in the 1930s, and an English immigrant mother, also Jewish. Jo grew up in a segregated community in Johannesburg, attended a Jewish school during her grade school years, and public schools for the rest of her education. Her family was not religious. She discussed the complicated nature of South African history, its politics, ethnic, racial and language mix during the years she grew up during the height of South African Apartheid.

Jo graduated from high school in 1980 and attended the University of Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, majoring in industrial psychology. Following her graduation in 1984, she traveled to Israel, England and Italy for several months, before returning to South Africa and working for a labor relations consulting firm. In 1987 she met Rabbi Michael Datz, a Reformed Jewish Rabbi who was on a sabbatical in South Africa. The two were married in a traditional service in May, 1989. In 1990 the couple spent several months on the island of Curaçao, and in 1991 they moved to Houston, Texas and lived with Michael's parents while he awaited a call from a Jewish congregation. In 1992 he accepted a call from Temple B'rith Sholom in Springfield, Illinois, where the couple has lived ever since. Jo is currently the executive director of the Jewish Federation of Springfield. She spoke at length about living in the United States, about the impact of the War on Terror, about growing anti-Semitism in the world, and about the current situation in Israel.
