Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Aaron Butler was born in Olney, Illinois in February 1976. He grew up in Mt. Carmel, Illinois and graduated from the Mt. Carmel High School in 1994. While there, Aaron played football, basketball and baseball as well as being involved in theatre. He graduated from the University of Evansville in 1988 with a major in secondary education with a focus on physics and math. In 2001 Aaron received a MS degree in educational administration from Southwest Baptist University and a Ph.D. in 2006 from the University of Missouri, St. Louis in educational leadership and policy studies. Aaron taught for nine years at Grandview R-2 High School, Granite City High School and McCleur High School in Florissant, Missouri. He spent four years as a Vice-Principal of Curriculum and Instruction and as Director of Federal Programs at Construction Career Charter School in St. Louis. In 2011, Aaron joined American Institutes for Research (AIR) as senior technical assistance consultant, and principal technical assistance consultant. He now serves as Director of Region 9 Comprehension Center, which serves Illinois and Iowa.
