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Abstract

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Jose Alberto Lera was born in Caracas, Venezuela on February 1, 1965 and raised there in the late 1960's to early 70's. Lera recalls that his childhood was simple, family oriented, and filled with storytelling by the family members, a key part of typical family gathering. His father instilled a strong work ethic in Jose, and he continues to live by the credo "be the best you can be." His father died when Jose was nineteen. Jose became a mechanic, working on any kind of boat, yacht, or marine engine. Eventually, he decided to immigrate to the United States, arriving in Miami, Florida in 1995 with little money and no fluency in English but with hopes and dreams to succeed and pursue a career in the marine maintenance work. Jose immigrated with his wife Yeni, and the couple struggled to live and survive in a new country. They worked together as a team in all aspects of life.

Jose eventually decided to move down to the Florida Keys and set up a home, establish roots, and use his extensive knowledge of maintaining watercraft to start his own business. He experienced defeat and discouragement, but also true encouragement and eventually success. (Jose is a master Yamaha Technician and owns his own business.) Both Yeni and Jose have found great friends and mentors over the years. They are raising two children. They are respected members of their community, and proud American citizens.
