Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Darrell Duensing was born in Steeleville, Illinois in February 1949, attended public schools and graduated from Southern Illinois University with a degree in agriculture sciences in 1971. Following graduation, he applied for the position of park ranger at Fort de Chartres, and was hired in December of 1971. Darrell lived in quarters located on the site of the restored French Fort that is located in Randolph County, four miles west of Prairie du Rocher, Illinois. The fort features a powder magazine that is believed to be the oldest building in Illinois. Three different forts were constructed by the French during their years in Illinois. Fort de Chartres is located where the last fort was constructed in the 1750s. Duensing served as site manager from 1971 until his retirement in December of 2015.

The interview covers his early years in Steeleville, college at Southern Illinois University, and his forty-five years working at Fort de Chartres. He discusses what it was like living at the fort, early floods, and the early years of Fort de Chartres Rendezvous, the special event held every June. The interview covers the first fourteen years of his tenure at the fort when the historic site was administered by the Illinois Department of Conservation, and the subsequent transition from IDOC to the newly created Illinois Historic Preservation Agency in 1985. Duensing also discussed how the budget reductions have impacted the historic site and the Rendezvous, the impact of the Great Flood of 1993, and the relationship between the local citizens and the fort.
