Abstract Redd Griffin, *Ronald Reagan*, ISR-V-D-2012 055

Biographical Information Overview of Interview: Redd Griffin was born on December 3, 1938 in Oak Park, IL. Redd attended Shimer College and went on to have careers as a newspaper reporter and also worked at WTTW TV. In 1960 he attended the Republican National Convention in Chicago and heard Goldwater speak. He greatly enjoyed the speech that Reagan gave in support of Goldwater, endorsing Goldwater as a candidate. While serving in the U.S. Army in the early 1960s, Griffin was stationed in Berlin; he viewed the Berlin Wall as a permanent feature of the city. Because of that, Reagan's June, 1987 speech in Berlin imploring the communists to "tear down this wall" made a profound impact on Griffin. Once Redd got involved with President Reagan's homecoming to Dixon in 1984, he deepened his interest in Ronald Reagan as a person as well as a politician. He discusses various aspects of Reagan's White House years, such as meeting with the landscape architect as well as the strength of the volunteer sector. Redd Griffin passed away in November of 2012, six months following this interview.
